










ALL INDIA STAKEHOLDERS MEETING

At the recent AISM session, delegates dove into the pressing issues faced by India's gig workers, including app-based drivers and delivery partners. These workers often struggle with low wages, lack of social security, and no formal job protections despite their significant contribution to the economy.



The discussions were intense and covered many angles. Saurabh Kirpal stood out by proposing stronger work contracts and a proper social security system tailored for gig workers. Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman also showed a genuine interest in pushing for policy reforms and fairer tax regulations that could benefit these workers.

However, not everyone was focused on worker welfare. Ashneer Grover claimed prioritized business growth, which led to criticism from other delegates who felt that workers' needs were being discarded.

Although the committee agreed on the urgency of improving gig workers' conditions, finding common ground proved difficult. Much of the debate turned into a blame game, with delegates pointing fingers rather than collaborating on solutions.

In conclusion, there was a shared call for establishing

tripartite committees involving the government, workers, and platform companies to regularly discuss policies. Passing legislation to ensure minimum wages, safety, and social security for gig workers emerged as a key priority.





excitement that this committee might highlight.



When the feedback for the Executive Board sessions was almost over, Shashi Tharoor humorously remarked that some of the speeches resembled hints of ChatGPT, and knowing that even in a serious committee, you have to have some fun. The Chair struck a perfect balance, directing the debate but allowing the delegates to debate freely, ensuring that that they heard all the arguments and counter-arguments.

Delegates submitted and received many POIs - orally and via regular and substantive chits, and the Chair encouraged POIs from all the delegates, all of which were received with diplomatic respect.


France called for a 20 minute unmoderated caucus, which carried by an overwhelming vote. In the unmoderated caucus, delegates were

workshopping the next potential topic to call for the moderated caucus under the agenda, and there was general consensus to move on topic of "Deliberation on the Need for Cybersecurity Frameworks and Laws Regarding the Privacy of Individuals."

At the next moderated caucus, impactful interventions came from the Marshall Islands and Luxembourg, highlighting small jurisdictions concerns about their vulnerability regarding cybersecurity, even when they may not have many resources.

While delegates diverged on the specific format of these frameworks, one thing that was consistent with all delegates, was that there is a need for more global action on privacy and measures to protect individual privacy.










In a moderated caucus on "Promoting international cooperation in protecting digital rights and advocating for the unrestricted flow of information," delegates grappled with the competing aims of free online space and national security. India, Australia, South Korea, Egypt, New Zealand, Estonia, the UAE and the UK saw a need for a





balanced approach and noted examples of this balance: UAE's hosting UNESCO's 3rd World OER Congress and UK's Online Safety Act. Japan, Italy, USA, Finland, Canada aimed for minimal censorship with focused on transparency and accountability whereas China and Russia were adamantly focused on internet sovereignty and preserving national interests. While there are differences and varying approaches, the space found some common denominators on global cooperation which included secure data exchange methods, digital rights coalitions, multilateral forums equitable access and valid safeguards on that access.


